

Restore - Nehemiah 1

And the God of all grace, who called you to his eternal glory in Christ, after you have suffered a little while, will himself restore you and make you strong, firm and steadfast. 1 Peter 5:10

Background and Context or Nehemiah

Nehemiah was one of the Jewish exiles in Babylon in 445 BC who had a passionate desire to rebuild the walls of Jerusalem, the Holy city that housed the temple of God. 141 years before (586 BC) it was destroyed by Nebuchadnezzar and then he captured the people of God and took them to Babylon for slave labour.

Now the exile was over. The Jewish people in exile had grown to about 2 million, but approximately only about 48,000 of them returned to Jerusalem to rebuild their nation. It was discouraging for them to observe how few people seemed to care about the health and wellbeing of the people of God as they carried out God's mission in that area.

Jerusalem had been burned and ravaged and it's three-kilometer-long wall was completely collapsed. After 141 years, you can imagine the grass and shrubs that had grown up amidst the rubble of the city. Imagine the non-Jewish people who were claiming ownership of the area, now that the Jewish people had been exiled. The returning Jews had no protection to resume their spiritual practices, as enemies were continually attacking and disrupting the way of life they were wanting to restore. They would build a bit, and then enemies would come and tear it down again. They would try to build a bit more, but then their enemies would tear it all down again. It must have felt like they were taking one step forward and two steps back.

No doubt the Jewish people were very discouraged. It probably felt like an impossible task and that there would be no way for the people of God to see their city, temple and way of life restored to its former glory.

But God had another plan. Like he raised up Daniel for such a time, so he raised up a man called Nehemiah to give leadership, and rally the people of God to accomplish an incredible feat. After extensive planning the whole project was completed in 52 days, an incredible achievement and testimony to God's goodness. And from that point on, the people of God were able to restore their practices of faith and carry on the work of God in their part of the world. It is an incredible story of restoration.

Nehemiah 1 Defining Reality

The words of Nehemiah son of Hakaliah: In the month of Kislev in the twentieth year, while I was in the citadel of Susa, ² Hanani, one of my brothers, came from Judah with some other men, and I questioned them about the Jewish remnant that had survived the exile, and also about Jerusalem. ³ They said to me, "Those who survived the exile and are back in the province are in great trouble and disgrace. The wall of Jerusalem is broken down, and its gates have been burned with fire." ⁴ When I heard these things, I sat down and wept. For some days I mourned and fasted and prayed before the God of heaven.
